Trips / Slips / Falls	All Society Members / Observers / External Speakers	6	<ul> <li>Immediate first aid provision can be given to injured participants by society members / staff on YSJ University Campus / external venue staff</li> <li>Inspection of meeting area is completed prior to society meeting, any foreign objects in the room that may cause injury or increase the chance of trips / slips and falls</li> <li>Any members using ladders must do so safely, if society members have any questions regarding the safe use of ladders, this should be raised with the relevant member of staff at the Students' Union</li> </ul>			
Muscle Strains / Bruising / Cuts / Bleeding	All Society Members / Observers / External Speakers	<ul> <li>mbers / a members suffering from muscle strains / bruising / cuts are immediately given the appropriate first aid provision</li> <li>Any member suffering severe injury in activity must seek further medical attention</li> </ul>				
Head / Spinal Injury	All Society Members	4	<ul> <li>If an individual is suspected to have suffered from a spinal / head injury the individual must NOT be moved</li> <li>Emergency services must be contacted immediately (999)</li> </ul>	4		
Fire	All Society Members / Observers / External Speakers	<ul> <li>All electrical equipment used must be PAT tested prior to its use at society meetings (ie stereo systems / CD players)</li> <li>All society members must understand and know the fire evacuation procedure and know where the nearest fire assembly point is</li> <li>In the case of a fire, all members, external speakers and observers must follow the evacuation procedure and inform security at the earliest possibility</li> </ul>				



Use of Equipment / Storage of Equipment	All Society Members	5	<ul> <li>No new equipment is to be ordered without authorisation from the SU (Matt Walton)</li> <li>Equipment must be PAT tested prior to use, no students should be bringing personal electronic equipment into society meetings without prior arrangement with staff from the Students' Union and permission from the University Health and Safety Advisor</li> </ul>	4
Trespassers	All Society Members / Observers / External Speakers	5	<ul> <li>If an external trespasses during a society meeting / rehearsal University Security Staff must be informed immediately, members must not tackle or challenge the individual</li> <li>Any activity that is deemed suspicious to Society members should be reported to staff on duty (especially if training on University owned facilities)</li> </ul>	3
Members with Medical Conditions	All Society Members	6	<ul> <li>Society Health and Safety Officers should keep a confidential file highlighting any medical conditions suffered by Society members, although this information should be kept confidential, when required, society Health and Safety officers should share this information with relevant others</li> </ul>	4
Lifting/carrying	All Society Members	4	<ul> <li>Correct footwear and clothing to be worn and protective clothing if there is a need</li> <li>Members are to be briefed on the correct lifting and handling procedures</li> <li>Larger items should be carried by a minimum of two people, especially on stairs</li> <li>Dollies can be used to move around scenery</li> <li>Most set pieces have been upgraded to have wheels to ease movement and reduce the need of lifting during rehearsals</li> </ul>	2
Broken or faulty props and set	All Society members	6	<ul> <li>Inspection of props and set is completed prior to society meeting</li> <li>Any broken or faulty props or set to be disposed of immediately and replaced</li> <li>No new equipment is to be ordered without authorisation from the SU (Matt Walton)</li> </ul>	3
